Topic:	Road Safety
Year level:	6
Title:	Road safety Books
Duration:	60 minutes + Reading Time

Lesson Objectives:

- Students analyse the different components that make up an engaging children's book
- Students write a children's (Year 1 audience) road safety book
- Students illustrate their books to coincide with their road safety message

Materials/ Equipment and Preparation:

- 'Click Clack Buckled in your booster seat' or 'That's the sound the street makes' both by Danny Katz

 these resources are from SDERA and should be located in your school library. Alternatively you can
 access both resources for free on iPads using their apps that are downloadable from the app store.
- Sign up to https://www.mystorybook.com/ (as a teacher) to allow students to access the website if you choose for them to create eBooks (optional)
- Print out the attached <u>story map</u> template (one per student)
- Print out the attached <u>illustration and text</u> template (one per student)



Time	Content
5 mins	Introduction: In previous lessons we have been discovering the importance of road safety, as a pedestrian, bicyclist and a passenger. Almost every day we are a road user in some form; this is why we need to make good choices while around our roads. We discussed in previous lessons that making poor decisions around our roads could have dangerous consequences.
	Learning about road safety from a young age is extremely important; this is why you are going to create your own road safety book. This book will be aimed at year 1 students, so if you can make it interesting, fun and even interactive the more the students will learn. Once we have finished writing, illustrating and designing your books we may go to go to the year 1 classes and read your stories to them.
15 mins	 Activity 1: Road safety stories Read 'Click Clack – Buckled in your booster seat' or 'That's the Sound the Street Makes' by Danny Katz Discuss what the students' favourite part of the books were Ask the students what were the safety messages the book was trying to convey Ask what were some books you liked reading when you were in year one and why? Can the students suggest features that should appear in a book that would appeal to a year one student? What are some interesting features of children's books, e.g. pop up books, touch and feel books, interactive computer read alongs.
30 mins	Activity 2: Story planning Using the story map (see attached) students are to create a story book with a road safety theme. The story map acts as a guide for students to complete the story writing process.
30mins	Activity 3: Road safety story creation Students are to use the illustration and text template (<u>see attached</u>) to assist them with their drawings and text layout.
	If students would like to use a computer to generate an e-book, the following website could assist the books development. However this may limit story sharing ability unless a class set of iPads could be arranged. <u>https://www.mystorybook.com/</u> Note: The teacher will have to create an online account to save the students stories, this account is free.
	Due to time restraints this activity may need to be completed in a follow up lesson.
10mins + practice time	Activity 4: Read and Share If time permits students should practice their presentation of their road safety storybooks e.g. including voices, actions etc.
	In the next lesson students could present their road safety book to the year one students.
1min	Conclusion: Congratulations everyone! You all worked really hard on your road safety story books. You are officially all book authors and illustrators, which is pretty impressive for year five student.
